German B2, the best condition for an internship



German language is necessary to work:

Only 0.73% of advertised positions are advertised in English and for academics - with a downward trend.

This does not mean that these positions are exclusively filled by internationals.

As an academic, you need German-C1 (minimal B2) to find a suitable job.

Only for computer scientists or natural scientists are there occasional job offers in English as the working language.



German language is necessary to work:

At the university there are courses (1-2 times a week) - free of charge. Intensive courses at various schools - fee-based

What is the best way to start a career?

- It is best to learn German during your studies and
- do some internships.
- An internship can turn into a student job.
- A student job can turn into a job after graduation.



Do I have a work permit?

Yes, all international and exchange Erasmus students

- for 140 full or 280 half days per year
- without application
- inform foreigners authority about a job
- approx. 20 hours per week (less is better for studying)
- EU citizens free access to the labor market



Do I have a work permit?

- you can also apply from your home country
- Erasmus students, if you are studying in a third country, are only allowed to do a 30-day holiday internship in Germany without pay



Work permit after graduation o I have a work permit?

- Residence application for employment, if suitable work
- If you do not have a job: Residence application for job search: up to 18 months work of any kind possible
- after that only in a job that is qualified and suitably paid
- You can look for work in any German city
- Rooms/flats in big cities are very expensive

Where do I begin?

A good CV in German with photo is the most important thing. Use the translation programme <u>DeepL</u>.

As a foreign student, it is helpful to have a particularly good CV shows that you have an open personality & are socially minded.



What information in the CV is important for an application in Germany?

In addition to work experience (internships) and professional training and schooling, **social commitment** is very important. A **membership** in an association for sports, society, and/or culture should be visible in your CV. (I can advise you on this) The decision-maker wants to see that you are social, responsible, and **integrated well into society**.















Why do I need a professional and social network?

- -you should tell all your friends and colleagues about your job search
- -and ask around for ideas
- visit career fairs and talk to people there and tell them about yourself and your search

This will give you very valuable information







Why do I need German contacts?

Around 30% of jobs are found through contacts, in smaller companies as many as 50%.

Nevertheless, the following applies: 70% through your own performance, 30% through relationships.

That means contacts are very important but you also have to be good for the job!

Contacts & German friends can be found in German Clubs!



Where can I find work study, junior jobs or an internship?

- on websites of suitable companies & research institutions,
 such as the Max Planck Institutes
- Many companies do not place their offers on search engines.
- For internships also apply on your own initiative.
- there is no organisation for internship placement
- internships not always paid for less than 3 months



Helper-Jobs in study training

- There are general & specific job exchanges for example:

"Uni Göttingen Stellwerk", jobs and internships for students

enter 3 search terms there (also on LinkedIn)

Which words should I use to search in the job portals?

Google/ Ecosia: Enter the activity/ task that you would like For example: data analysis, or research, biology, student job

Then you will see many offers come up and you will be able to find relevant search terms: industries, divisions/departments, companies, keywords, job names, technical terms.

You can continue your search using these terms.



Helper-Jobs in study training

plenty of jobs without job experience.

For example: working in gastronomy, in logistic, foodservice (with your own bicycle), in the kitchen, in a bakery, cleaning, and/or childcare and care of elderly people.

If you are looking for a job in gastronomy, its best to go straight to the location and ask workers there directly.

Most kitchens are always looking for help,

also with little German.







Where do I have a good chance of finding something?

Search **directly** on company websites, even in small towns of the area.

For example:

Duderstadt, Einbeck, Northeim, Hann. Münden, Osterode











What is the most important thing in an application?

- 1. curriculum vitae
- 2. Certificates (University of Göttingen-Enrollment, Bachelor-Transcript, references, certificates of work), max 6
- 3. application letter



How do I formulate a cover letter?

You should adapt your CV & cover letter to the advertised position!

Please go into detail about each required activity in the job description.

Write about why you are able to do each task and where you have already applied the required skills.



Who can look over my cover letter and CV?

I would be happy to review your cover letter to see if it is suitable for the advertised position.

If you want, I can contact the company where you are applying.



How shall I submit the application?

application: cover letter, CV and max. **6 certificates** (Flex Now of university, transcript of bachelor, <u>employment</u>, <u>recommendation</u> <u>letters</u>).

As a general rule, <u>merge the cover letter, CV and certificates into one PDF</u>. The PDF should not exceed 2-5 MB in size. If you include a German reference letter in the CV, it may help.

The email text should only be 2 -3 sentences long and your full contact information should be under your name.



For 18 months after graduation, you will have an Aufenthaltserlaubnis zur Arbeitssuche to look for work.

You have the option of obtaining a <u>residence permit</u> for up to 18 months from the city's International Office to search for a job.

During these 18 months, you may take up any kind of activity.



Have a bachelor's degree from your home country recognized as a professional qualification

You can have a bachelor's degree from your home country recognized by the KMK/ZAB. You will then be considered as a "skilled worker" in Germany. If you can then present an employment contract that matches your Bachelor's degree, you can apply for a residence permit for gainful employment for skilled workers at the Foreigners' Registration Office. In this way you can switch from studying to gainful employment.



What can I do if I want to discontinue my studies?

There are over 450 apprenticeships in Germany: <u>250 in industry and commerce</u>, 130 <u>in craft (Handwerk)</u>, 14 <u>in agriculture, gardening</u>, 62 <u>in healthcare</u>

For a (3-year) apprenticeship, you need a **German B2 language**. with an apprenticeship: guarantee of a job in Germany



You have an interview for a job or an internship?

Do I have to pay taxes?

Yes, you need your tax ID (identification) number for an employment contract.

You apply for it at the tax office in Göttingen.
